



Restorative Justice Program of the Sunshine Coast (RJPSC)  
ANNUAL REPORT FOR the Year 2021

A. Introduction

2021 proved to be a very challenging year for RJPSC; I am so proud of the perseverance and adaptability of our dedicated volunteers and support staff to respond by pivoting 90% of our work to be done online, with most communications, meetings, program delivery, and training completed on Zoom and working remotely. This was no small feat for an organization that almost exclusively functioned through in-person meetings pre-pandemic.

One of the Board's accomplishments in 2021 was an update of our Vision and Mission statements and a review of our Core Values. They are as follows:

The RJPSC's Vision is: a future in which restorative justice and restorative practices are embedded throughout the Sunshine Coast.

Our Mission is: to heal harms and to restore and build healthy relationships in our community.

We support this Vision and Mission by practicing our Core Values of: Healing, Safety, Honesty, Respect, Compassion, Reconciliation, Connection, Inclusion, Trust, Listening, Accountability.

B. Highlights of RJPSC Activities in 2021

a) Volunteer trainings offered on Zoom included: Compassionate Listening; Understanding Neurodiversity/Brain Difference; Peace-Making Dialogue Circle Training; Truth and Reconciliation Commission and United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples documents - Reading and Dialogue group

b) Youth Engagement Projects: Our services are delivered to all residents of the Sunshine Coast; however, in 2021, there was a significant gap in services and consistent school and work environments for youth in particular. A small focus group of youth provided the information and ideas for the development of in-person and online activities to address their increased feeling of social isolation and depression. To this end, two pilot programs were



offered over Zoom, the “Youth Unmuted” dialogue circle and the “Cook to Connect” Zoom circles.

In addition, we were able to hire three youths interested in restorative work experience to work part-time with the youths and community projects and develop and practice leadership and restorative circles, citizenry, transferable employment skills, and positive work habits, health and life balance. Everyone learned how to transition from in-person work and learning to a hybrid combination of online and in-person. The employment piece was made possible in part by employment funding support from the Federal Government of Canada Summer Jobs program.

- c) Strategic Planning on Zoom in June 2021: This helped Our Board and organization to set our strategic goals and focus our efforts for the next three to five years.
- d) Pivoting our facilitation to Zoom so that our Community Justice Forums and Peace-making Circle Dialogues proceeded online rather than in person, still maintaining the confidentiality and healing processes that the community has come to expect from the RJPSC.
- e) Restorative Process Outcomes: funding from 4 sources provided a variety of restorative processes for referrals from community and service organizations, RCMP, Crown Council, individuals, Department of Fisheries and Oceans, schools, recreation and park facilities. Over 300 people from across the coast directly benefited from restorative processes and their positive outcomes. Specific referral types included vandalism, theft under 5K, uttering threats, graffiti, assault with a weapon, business, group and organizational conflict. Of the fourteen individuals referred to the program for criminal acts, seven received additional support to address challenges related to brain differences and injuries, mental health and addictions and grief and trauma as part of the written resolution agreements. With partnership and grant funds, the program provided “wrap around” support for those referred to the program, along with family and survivor conferencing and supper evening circles. Resolution agreements included repairing damaged property, regular mentoring and volunteerism with community activities and non-profit groups, Elder mentorship and learning indigenous ways of



being and protecting of nature, and creating artwork to give to volunteers as appreciation gifts and honoraria.
